



#### Addition

\$54.70 Keep those decimal 21.35 points lined up! + 3.50 This keeps the digits in their correct columns. \$79.55



#### Subtraction

\$59.25 Lining up decimal points -17.70is important here too. Remember to regroup \$41.55 when necessary.






