Principal's Message

Our 2016 Performing Arts Showcase was, again, an outstanding demonstration of the talent, commitment and joy our children experience through their participation in school activities. Thanks to the dedication of our teachers and the support of our parents, 500 students sang, danced and played to a packed audience at the Marana Auditorium. The night was a resounding success!



At the opening of the Showcase, I spoke for a few minutes on the concept of success and what it means at Hurstville Public School. This is what I said:

"Our school's motto is "Strive for Success". Just three little words that we perhaps take for granted or on face value – or maybe about which we don't think much at all!

And yet I believe it is crucial that we do think about it, especially about the notion of success. For the last couple of years, as part of our School Plan, Hurstville Public School has been actively engaged in examining what "success" means for the more than 1200 students in our care.

What is success? What does it look like? How do we measure it? Who can be successful? Is it the same for everybody?

If we believe today's media, it would seem "success" is defined by wealth, status, power and fame rather than by the quality of a person's character or by a life well-lived. For some, it is measured by what you have, rather than by what you do with what you have.

As parents and educators, what does success mean to us?

By most people's measures, the late Albert Schweitzer was a successful man. He was a doctor, musician, philosopher, theologian and Nobel Peace Prize Winner: a man of significance who made a lasting contribution to his society in a variety of fields; someone to listen to and learn from. This is what Dr Schweitzer had to say about success:

Success is not the key to happiness: happiness is the key to success. If you love what you are doing, you will be successful.

Now while this may be a little simplistic, the underlying message is very true. Maybe we can't always love every aspect of our lives; there are always things we have to do, rather than want to do. We can't always expect to be happy, every hour of every day.

However, as parents and educators, it is our role to help our children to find talents, interests and activities that <u>they</u> enjoy (not that we think are good for them); and that will give them pleasure, satisfaction, comfort and release during stressful and challenging times. Allowing them to have some choice and control when finding things to do that they really enjoy is an important gift we can give our children. It says their happiness is important to us.

And, in valuing our children's happiness, we are also supporting them to Strive for Success. Tonight, we will see hundreds of our children who are creative and collaborative; who have committed to a group; who have practiced and prepared; who have found an interest and applied themselves to improving. Most importantly of all, we will see happy children who are successful children.

In short, we will see our school motto, "Strive for Success", in action."

My heartfelt thanks go to all of the teachers who worked so hard to organise and deliver this wonderful event, especially to the main organisers: Mrs Muir, Ms Roebuck, Mrs Cusumano and Mr Pratt. I am sure 2017 will continue to provide our children with many ways to be happy, and therefore successful, at Hurstville Public School and in life.

















Planning for 2017

To assist with the organisation of classes for 2017, it is crucial that we have accurate numbers of students who will be in each grade.

Please make sure that you inform the office, in writing, if your child currently in K-5 will not be returning to our school next year. We need this information by next Friday. Thank you to those families who have already contacted us. If you have mentioned it to a teacher, but not the office staff, please confirm your intentions with our office so that our records are accurate.

All care is taken in placing students into their new classes each year. There are many, many factors taken into consideration (you can't imagine how many!!) in arriving at the best arrangement within the limitations we have. If there are particular circumstances concerning your child of which their teachers and I are not aware, please let me know, in writing by next Friday 11 November. If we have spoken earlier in the year, or in previous years, a reminder note to me would be appreciated. However, please be mindful that we are placing 1,230 students into 50 classes and there are limits as to what is possible or even advisable. Requests for particular teachers cannot be accommodated.

Our teachers bring a great deal of insight to their discussions when forming class groups. They see your child in different situations and in different peer groups. Forming classes that are balanced and best able to operate well throughout the year is their first objective. We take into account the academic, social and personal needs of students and do our best to provide structures that will meet these needs. We are looking at how the whole class will operate, and try to put together cohesive groups which have the best chance of a happy and successful year.

Different teachers develop different strengths in children. Across their 13 years of schooling, children will take from their teachers different skills and approaches to learning and life. Sometimes, what a particular child needs or may benefit from, may not be what he or she most likes or feels comfortable with. Peer groups also change with time and age and interests. Having the confidence and support to form new relationships with teachers and friends is an important skill. Change for some children is difficult and upsetting. For others, it is no trouble at all.

Please be assured that every care and consideration is given to making transitions into the coming year as smooth and successful as possible. We try very hard to get the best outcome for all of our students, within the constraints that we have.

Once the classes are formed next year, no changes will be made as there is a "knock on' effect which then interferes with all of the other factors which have been considered and acted upon.

Science "Materials For The Job - Colonising Mars"

In pairs, we researched how the Mars Rovers were built and deployed by NASA, then we designed and made our own simulated rovers from everyday materials. In reality, the rovers have been built from 21st century materials like nitinol (memory metal). Such products allow NASA scientists to remotely control the Mars surface exploration by the rovers.

5H is currently working on the future of a colony on Mars. We are investigating which materials on Earth and potential resources on Mars itself, could best be used to construct safe, self-sufficient biomes for a range of essential functions to keep a new colony of people, animals and plants sustained for an extended period of time.

Some girls in Grace's year four class were taking turns at skipping. Grace watched them closely and decided she would like to have a turn too. She asked to join in but Sally said: "It's too hard for you."

Grace had an intellectual disability. This meant she sometimes took longer to learn things. She was also not as well coordinated in sports as the other girls. "Come on. Let me have a turn," said Grace. "Anyone can have a turn," said Deepa. "Have your turn after me."

So Grace tried to skip over the rope, but it got caught at her feet. "Try again", a few of the girls said. "You have to jump just as it hits the ground." Grace tried again. They gave her extra tries because she was learning. On the last try she managed two skips in a row. "You did it!" said Deepa. Grace was really proud. "I did it!" she said, "and you helped me".

Learning to see another person's point of view

Learning to see another person's point of view is important for getting along with others and building positive friendships. Understanding others helps children know what to do in social situations and is the basis for developing caring and responsibility. It's not always easy for children to see the point of view of someone who is different from them. Being different could mean having a disability, coming from a different country, being a different age or gender, or having different values and interests. Children who are seen as different may be left out of activities. They may face discrimination because others think they are not as good, as talented, or as important as they are. Discrimination can have very negative effects on children's self-esteem and mental health and wellbeing.

Skills for empathy

Taking others' needs into account involves values of caring, compassion and acceptance of others. It also involves emotional skills for empathy. Learning to empathise with another person means learning to 'walk in their shoes.' It means being able to recognise and value their feelings and needs, even though they may be different from your own. Skills for empathy develop over time and include:

- recognising your own feelings
- recognising others' feelings
- · listening to others' opinions
- thinking what it would feel like if you saw the situation their way
- thinking how you can respond in a caring way
- doing something to help.

Some children find it easy to tune into feelings. Others need more guidance to learn empathic skills. Adults have an important role in supporting children to learn kindness and empathy

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Learning to value others

How parents and carers can help

- Research has found that the examples shown by caring adults have a big influence on children's empathy. Parents and carers (as well as school staff) can also foster empathy by promoting values of caring and compassion and coaching children to be kind and thoughtful towards others.
- Model empathy by tuning into children's feelings (eg "Ouch! That must have hurt," or "You must be feeling disappointed that your friend can't come over").
- Help children think about how feelings affect other people (eg "How do you think your friend might be feeling?").
- Help children develop skills for understanding other people's points of view by discussing the effects
 of discrimination and the importance of respectful and caring attitudes towards everybody.
- Talk about situations that involve empathy (eg "What I liked about the story was how kind the hero was," or "That was a mean thing to do. Don't you think she should have helped her friend?").
- Notice when children are kind and let them know you value their behaviour (eg "That was a very thoughtful thing to do. I really appreciate it!").

How to support children to accept and include others

- Teach children that there is nothing wrong with being different and that each of us is different to somebody else.
- Teach children that everyone has a right to be respected.
- Help children develop skills for positive friendships and cooperative play.
- Parents and carers of children with special needs can talk to their children's teachers about how to support their strengths and about encouraging other children to include them.


